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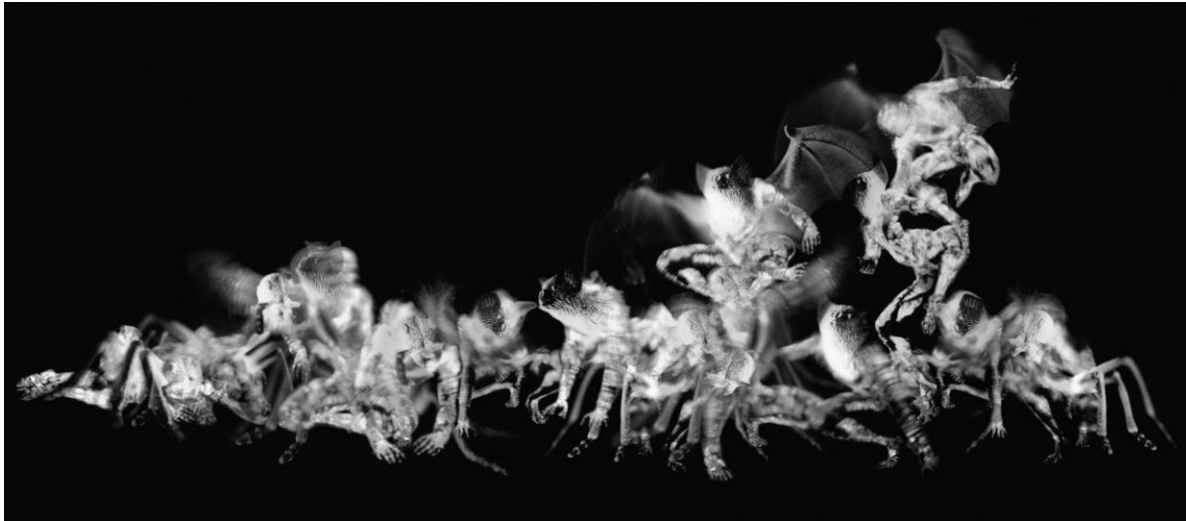

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Welcome



“It may well be wondered what kind of operation this will be, to produce the concept of something we cannot imagine.”

“If there is always a mental dimension to the neuronal and a neuronal dimension to the mental, then we must suppose that this continuity is in some way itself neuronal and mental, biological and cultural.”

— Catherine Malabou, *What Should We Do With Our Brain?*

We’re all out of our minds, in more ways than one. Some things we consciously put out of mind in order to think, while others gain their potency precisely from having always been outside of mind ‘proper.’ Madness, post- and pre-neuroscience, precognition, superstition, stupidity (*bêtise*), and bureaucracy all obtain on the question of our minds and their relation to thinking. Moreover, much recent Humanities scholarship has questioned the extent to which these minds were properly ours to begin with. In our present moment, the parts of our actions that exceed our conscious decision-making are heightened by the premediating effects of affective, hyperobjective, aesthetic, and algorithmic logics that are fundamentally alien to human cognition, even while they directly impact how we think and act in our daily lives. If the 2017 SLSA meeting indexed the fact that “anthropos is constituted by temporalities that are in excess of it,” our 2018 gathering will double down on this position to ask after the conditions, preclusions, and exclusions that make it thinkable in the first place.

And really, what does ‘thinkability’ even mean today, when so many of our experiences—political and otherwise—seem unthinkable? Importantly, the questions raised by the various profiles of “the nonhuman turn” have moved beyond the simple (but crucial) critical decentering of the self-possessed human individual to open onto the ways that cognition’s distributions are also aggregations, often advancing political and corporate agendas that are as devastating as they are headless. Put simply, all of this brings to mind a vexing problem: on one hand we know better than ever that we need to let go of the hubris of individual understanding in order to learn to think collectively and in deep temporalities, while on the other hand what is needed more than ever is mindfulness and rationality in the face of proliferating global crises. That is, (n)eurocentrism abounds; what’s to be done about it?

“Bewilderment: Queer Theory After Nature”

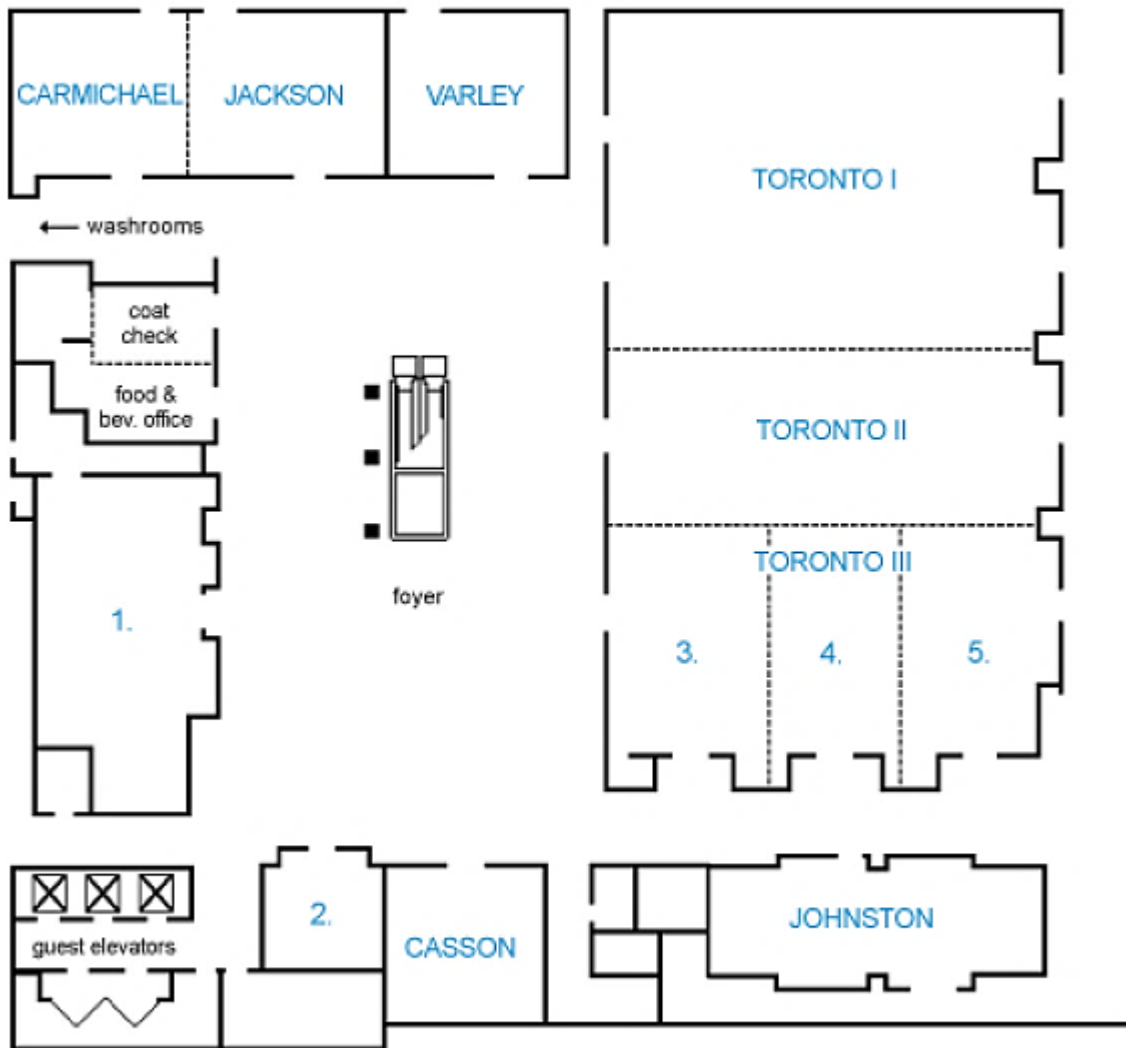

ABSTRACT: Wildness is easily recognized as part of a colonial epistemology within which colonizers cast non-metropolitan spaces as savage, wild and in need of cultivation. Obviously, then, “the wild” is a loaded term that still reeks of its colonial function – while in the nineteenth century “the wild” still took something like “nature” as its referent, by the late 19th and early 20th century, the wild had become part of a colonial division of the world into the modern and the primitive. We cannot simply shake free of that division but we can think about what wildness might signify in a post-colonial world and within an anti-colonial project. I will trace new forms of disordered wildness as part of a decolonizing project and use the work of First Nations artist Kent Monkman as an example of decolonizing bewilderment.

Jack Halberstam is Professor of Gender Studies and English at Columbia University. Halberstam is the author of several books, including *Trans: A Quick and Quirky Guide to Gender Variability* (U of California Press, 2018), *Gaga Feminism: Sex, Gender, and the End of Normal* (Beacon Press, 2012), and *The Queer Art of Failure* (Duke UP, 2011).

HILTON TORONTO - CONVENTION LEVEL



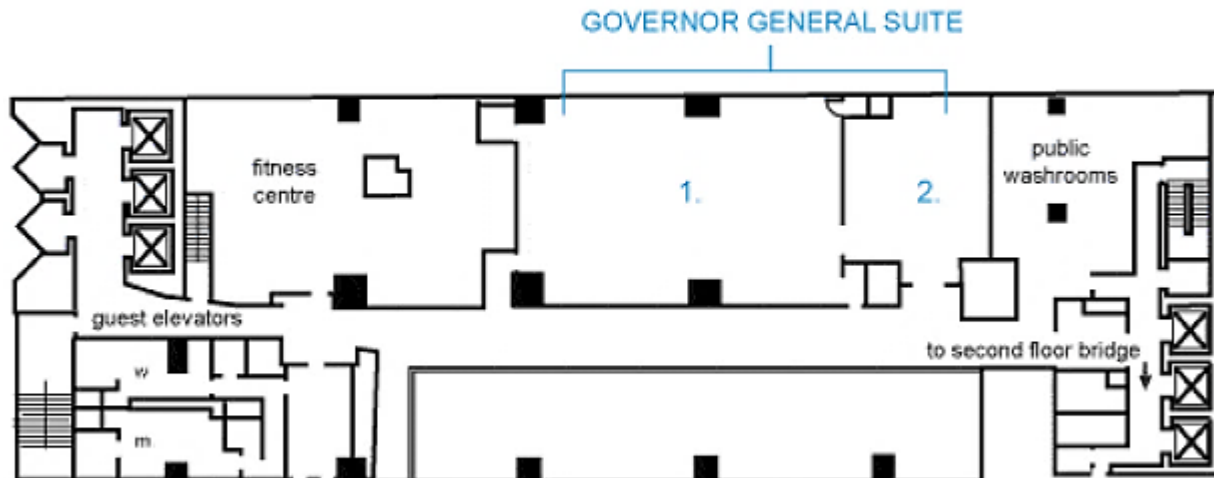

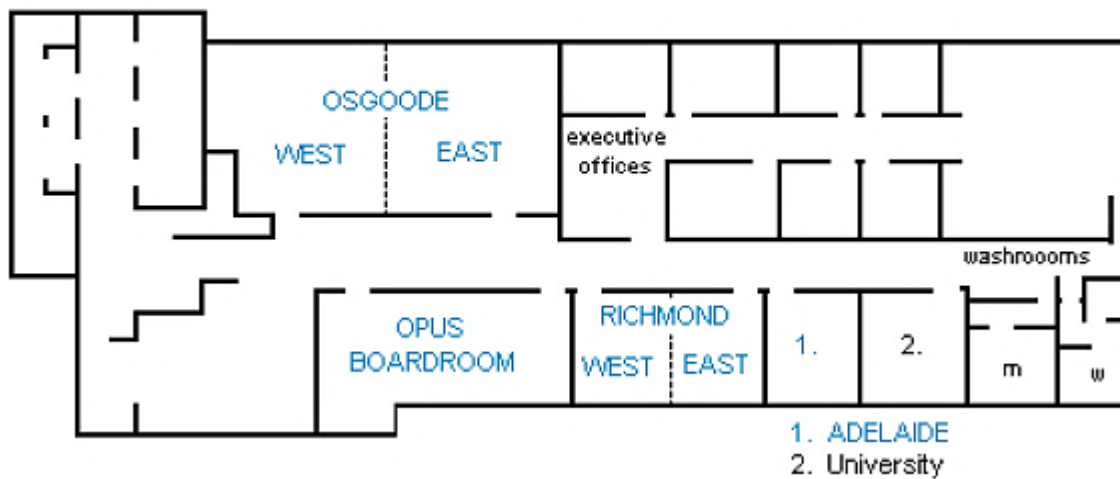

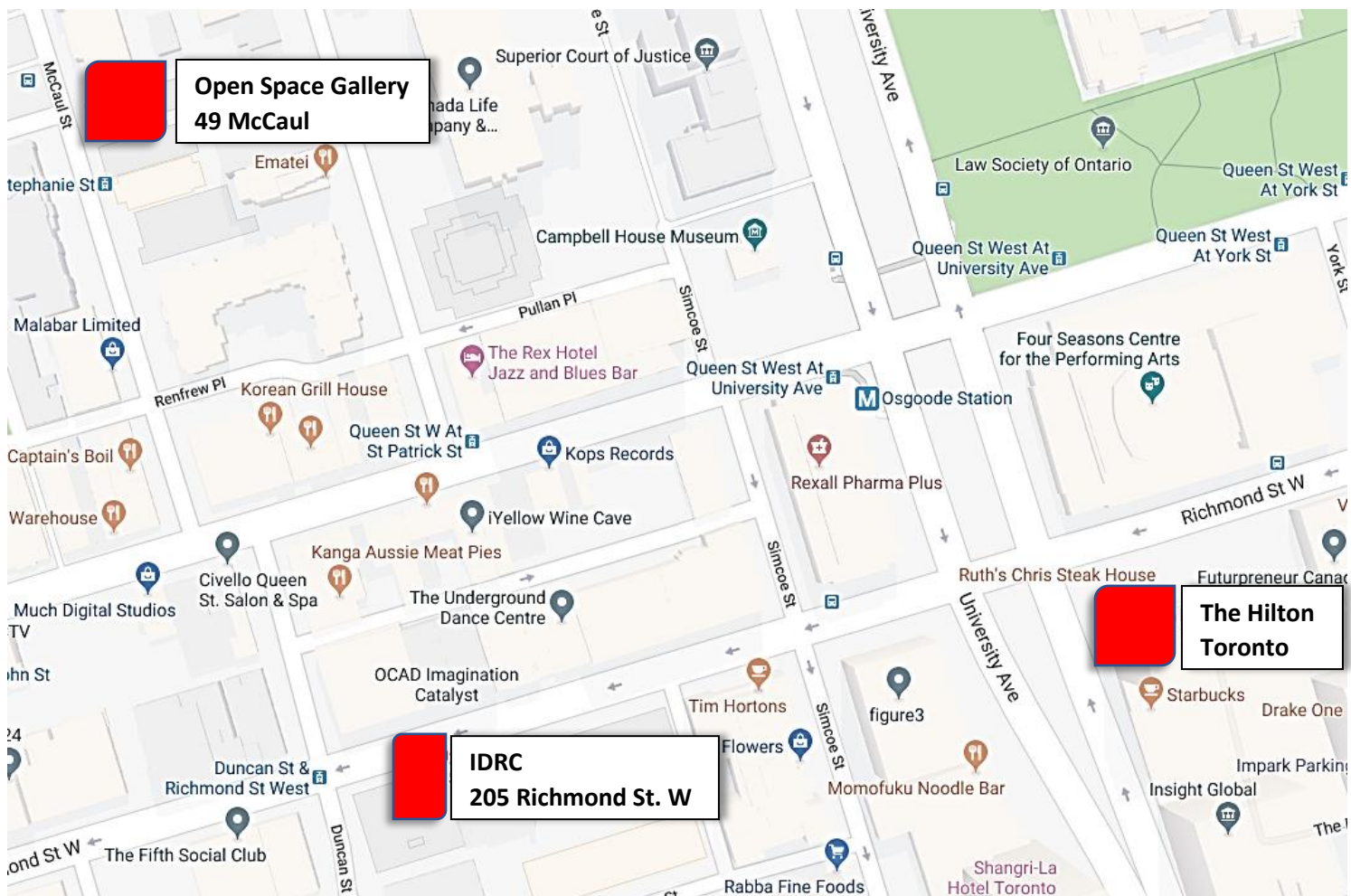

When not touring the globe as the featured soloist with hip-hop superstar JAY-Z or subbing into pop legend Paul Simon's band, the Toronto-based, New York schooled, Trinidadian-born trumpet player BROWNMEN ALI is writing music that draws on his degree in Physics with a minor in Philosophy (U of Waterloo).

Among The Brownman Electric trio's [awards & accolades](#) is the 2015 International Independent Music Award for "Jazz-Funk Album of the Year" for *Gravitation*, and a 2015 Toronto Independent Music Award for "Jazz Group of the Year".

"The trio folds aspects of Black American Music into a chordless jazz framework", says Brownman. "When we're not playing originals, we often take classic standards from the 30s through the 50s and re-imagine them as if they were written today and being produced by, say, DJ Premier. The end result is something that hopefully sounds relevant in today's musical paradigm, but still resonates with the history and lineage of the jazz tradition. And yeah - you'll hear a lot of Miles Davis' influence in that resulting sound".

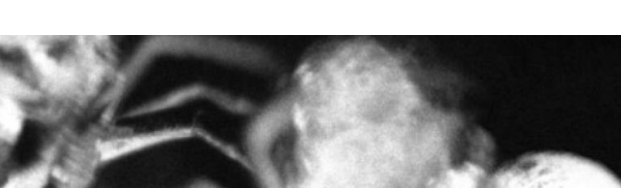

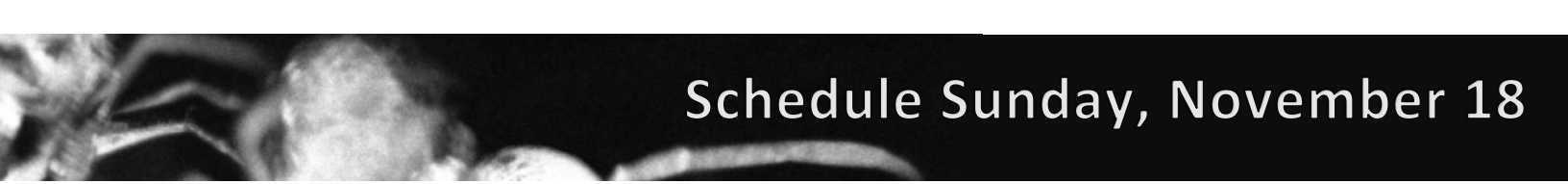

Excerpt from Exhibition Statement

In response to the **Out of Mind** theme of this year's SLSA conference, **Multiple Contingencies** explores some of the foreign and extra-rational forces that challenge and undo the way our minds run.

The notion of 'contingency' carries countless contradictions. It asks that we prepare for unforeseen circumstances; costs us resources we may not have; and resists one's obsession to know **for sure**. It demands a long term plan but threatens to sabotage with a fierce immediacy, offering no guarantee of how it'll all play out. As a result, we are subject to a plurality of encounters: a multiplicity that is often overwhelming and anxiety-inducing.

Sometimes, we contend with that infinite possibility and unending precarity by compressing it into a single feeling of uncertainty. Dealing in the singular allows us to contain it in our minds—systemize it, intellectualize it. But there's no denying the slippery, overflowing character of chance. Uncertainty of this kind shakes the psychological drive for estimation: our drive to **know** in advance, to **know** what to expect and act in accordance with that. No matter how thoroughly we conceptualize a plan and check for risks, we are always subject to some level of unpredictability, some force of nature ready to deter or destroy our plans. In many ways, this unpredictability is humbling, even humiliating. For some, it is terrifying. It's no wonder, then, we spend so much time preparing for and worrying about the future.

It goes without saying that even when chance and control contradict each other, they have a productive relationship. Retrospective reflections with chance encounters become insight and constitute preparation for the future. And often, even in the face of chance, forethought and intention can pay off.

But these forms of control can also give way to paranoia, oversurveillance, and an unquenchable thirst for authority. And maybe there's something intensely satisfying about not being in control; *not* knowing. Complete predictability is arguably just a path to ennui, so we can thank the extra-rational, extra-cognitive domains of our lives for helping us avoid a fate of monotonous determination. Perhaps more encouragingly, the existence of phenomena that can act or think **otherwise** offers up potential for beneficial forms of interdependency and trust. Maybe we don't always have to be in control. Maybe we can depend on or benefit from other ways of thinking and being. Whatever it "may be", this much is clear: there is room for the forgetful, speculative, imaginary, non-sensical, and extra-rational that drive our encounters with the unexpected. There is room for being "out of your mind," as much as there is room for mindful and intellectually robust endeavours. And if we are to remind or re-wire ourselves for a different kind of potential, maybe we need to consider what lies beyond the self-assurance of "level-headed" and neurocentric thinking.

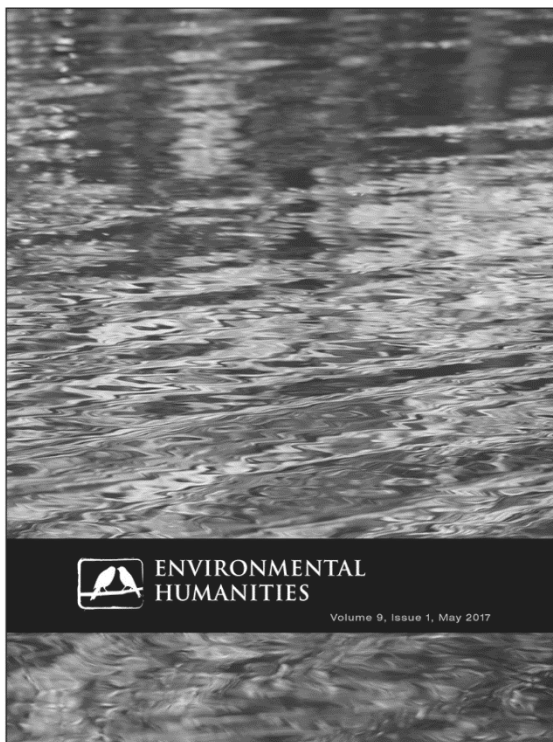
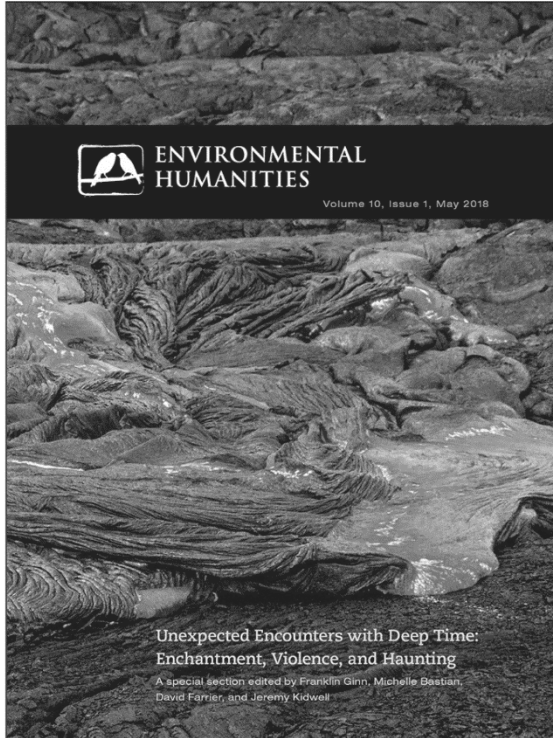
